


MARKETING YOUR BOOK

Now that you have written a book, what are you going to do with it? Let's talk about options.

The first thing is to make up your mind

as to what you want to do. Once you have done that, write it down, look it over once, twice, three times. Rewrite it and put it in your manuscript so you don't lose or forget it. If you are really up to it, go on right then. Don't hesitate! Get to it!



If you are going to self-publish, you will need a few things, such as ISBN and who you want to print your book. At that point there are a number of options to consider, including the color of the paper, font, font size, the number of copies, cover design, front and back, and of course, the cost. Have you had it edited and beta read? After it is at the printers, it's too late.

If you are considering traditional publishing, you will need to get an agent. Then you have the query letter to write. Don't rely only on yourself. Get help! The PNWA conference, September 2024, is a good place

to start. There is a publication of all agents, what they are looking for and what they want in a query and or submission. The public library may have a copy or possibly you can find a copy to use elsewhere.

After you have copies of your book in hand, getting it out there and on store shelves can be difficult. Advertising is an option.

I plan to suggest that Spokane Authors form a small committee to assist with public advertising. We need to investigate "Who," "What," "Where," and the cost involved. There are many options in the public domain. Book signings are important and can be profitable. They might at least cover the cost of printing and leave enough to buy a Wendy's burger. Getting your book into the publics' hands takes work and advertising, not to mention money. There are more options available than you may realize. You just need to find them.

Okay, that's enough babble from me. Happy Writing!

By then our time was nearly up, so we said "good-bye" and headed our separate ways.





FEATURED BOOK REVIEWS

Last month we only had room for one of two reviews of Angels Three Six. Here is the second review in our files, plus reviews of a few more books.


In the late 50's and early '60s, while I was hiding under my school desk, Colonel

Lehman was practicing shooting down Russian planes so that they would not drop atomic bombs on me. Now he has written a book about his exploits piloting jet planes, primarily F-102s and F-106s. And what a book it is! One harrowing experience after another (mostly at 600 miles an hour); near misses, forgetting he had a pistol in his pocket as he stood next to President Kennedy, icing up so severely that the plane was nearly uncontrollable. A brief book that you can't put down because you're always anxious to get to the next adventure. Just wish it was longer.

Whether it's the Cuban Missile Crisis or bringing lobsters back to the base in a missile pod, there's never a dull moment in Colonel Lehman's "Cold War" fighter pilot career.

In addition to being a highly skilled pilot, turns out Lehman is also a highly skilled writer, relating these exploits in a You-Are-There style that will keep you engrossed right up to the end of his Cold War career.

Thank you, Chuck, for your service in protecting all of us U.S. citizens, and thank you Chuck for writing this wonderful book.

The Ant Doctor by Nathaniel Bennett is a post-civil war adventure full of virtuous heroes and dishonorable villains. The main character, Jonathan Haggen, is a blend of a southern gentleman, the Lone Ranger, and a dash of Chuck Norris. With his no-nonsense friend, a freed slave, Moses beside him, the two travel until they find a place to build their home and a community.

Educated, honorable, and wise to the world's ways, the two share many adventures, establish a civil society within their town, and punish any scoundrels who get in the way.

Bennett's well-written story moves back and forth through time weaving vignettes from his characters' lives together in such a way as to keep the reader engaged and bring the ending to a satisfying fruition.



At first glance, the title of the book might suggest a story about an entomologist, a person studying ants and other insects. That is not the case, although upon reading the story one will discover that there is a doctor and there are ants.

This is a story of a family set against the backdrop of the American Civil War. Jonathan Haggen is a son of the old slave-owning South, but an individual who has different, perhaps radical opinions regarding many of the practices of the time. While he could stay and control his family's plantation, he sets out on a different path. The story relates his tale as well as the tales of many of his family and friends, tying all together at the end.


This is a book one will read in a minimum number of sittings, as it is nearly impossible to put down.

When their father is apparently killed in a plane crash, life for Toby and Katie Cypher suddenly changes. I had never been a fan of books on naval history nor of fantasy... until now. D. Andrew McChesney has made me a believer. Beyond the Ocean's Edge is an extremely well-written, fascinating tale about the good ship, Island Expedition, its captain, Edward Pierce, and their amazing adventures. This book, my friend, is the work of a professional author – as if Tolkien and Michener had collaborated. McChesney has excellent command of the English language and takes you on an adventure that you'll have a tough time pulling away from. It has just the right amount – and at the right times – of excitement. It's

beautifully paced writing. And he does what all good fantasy writers do: He makes the unbelievable, believable.

Beyond the Ocean's Edge is set at the beginning of the nineteenth century just after England and France have agreed to an uneasy peace. Pierce and company set sail toward an island that does not appear on any map; it is found only in legend. They overcome many obstacles, including a ferocious sea battle, as they zigzag their way there. And I'd best not give away any additional parts of the story.

I was all geared-up for a fantastic ending that would blow me away, but then I remembered that this book is Part I of the *Stone Island Sea Stories*, so I'll have to wait till I've finished the last in the series for that fantastic ending. But his writing has left me wanting more. I'm very anxious for that second book to appear. And the third.

If you like a well-written naval history with cannon fire and a little fantasy thrown in, you're gonna love *Beyond the Ocean's Edge* (and, I'm sure, the entire series).

Mr. McChesney has a talent for putting his reader in the moment. From the first pages that put me in the middle of a battle at sea, I felt like I was part of the tale.

Written with a mix of action and character development, the story moves along

and makes it hard to put down. I loved, or hated, his characters and my heart pounded as they fought their way through storms and skirmishes. It melted at interjections of romance and tapped away in excitement as they found a new world.

The end leaves you wanting more and luckily, I have the second book and was able to read on. I would suggest that anyone who purchases Beyond the Ocean's Edge should go ahead and get Sailing Dangerous Waters, so you don't have to wait for shipping time.

McChesney instantaneously transports the reader back in space and time to the deck of the Theadora in the year 1802. She is a British sailing ship about to do battle with the French, and hero Edward Pierce leads a boarding crew to victory. McChesney's use of nautical terms soon creeps into your own vocabulary, and his descriptions can draw you into the belief that you can smell the salt air and feel the ship roll with the waves beneath your feet. Then the real story begins. After a short stint on land, newly commissioned Captain Pierce and his fine crew set off with a group of would-be colonists in search of the uncharted Stone Island. The quest takes them further from home than they could have imagined, and Pierce even more distant from Evangeline, the woman he loves. The first of a series, Beyond The Ocean's Edge will sail you beyond the charted seas and into a fantastic adventure.
